• Voice/persona:

What does either Whitman or the persona sound like he's trying to do in this poem?

What kind of argument does the voice/persona make here?

How does the voice/persona make his argument?

Does the voice/persona repeat words, phrases, or constructions to help make the argument or point?

What part does sound itself play in this poem?

What would you say is the poem's tone? On what evidence do you base this conclusion?

• Figures of speech:

Does the voice/persona use *simile* or *metaphor*? To what effect?

• Meter/rhythm/sound:

If this is "free verse" (look this up), how does *line length* play into how the poem works?

Does Whitman here make use of enjambment? To what effect?

What kind of sound does the voice/persona create, and how? (alliteration, assonance, consonance, sibilance, etc.)

• Imagery/ Symbols/references/motifs/etc:

What kind of imagery does the voice/persona use here?

Do any elements in the narrative work as controlling images? (controlling image/conceit)

• Themes (what the poem is about):
